

Health tip of the month

High blood pressure or hypertension is a dangerous condition in which pressure of the blood in the arteries is higher than normal.

Normal blood pressure varies with the individual. There are two pressure readings. Systolic pressure is a measure of the blood pressure as the heart muscle contracts. Diastolic pressure of the blood pressure is when the heart muscle relaxes. In adults the normal range of systolic pressure is about 120 to 140 millimeters and the range for diastolic pressure is 65 to 90 millimeters. Blood pressure is stated as the systolic pressure over the diastolic pressure. A reading of 120 over 80 is about average blood pressure for adults under 40 years of age.

There are several factors that lead to high blood pressure such as age, sex, weight (obesity), diet, emotional state, and smoking.

Once high blood pressure is detected, effective treatment is usually possible. There are several ways to treat hypertension. Drugs can lower blood pressure along with special diets that are low in saturated fats and sodium (table salt). A reducing diet may help to lower an overweight person's blood pressure. People with high blood pressure are also advised to stop smoking.

Check your blood pressure once a month.




