

Knight's Tales

(Our Order) had a very unpretentious beginning in 1868. We began as a social club for minstrel show performers, called the "Jolly Corks".

In that year some notable events did happen in the now United States. The House of Representatives voted 126 to 47 to impeach President Andrew Johnson. "Decoration Day", later called Memorial Day, is first observed in Northern US states. The city of Reno, Nevada, was founded. The 9th British Golf Open: Tom Morris, Jr. shoots a 154 at Prestwick Golf Club (three shots better than his father, Tom Morris, Sr.) Our US Secretary of State William H. Seward announces 14th Amendment ratified by states, grants citizenship to ex-slaves.

When we were founded in New York, New York in 1868, the population was around 942,292. Today our organization has more members than NY (back then) and we are referred to as one of America's most formidable, charitable, and service oriented orders with more than a million members, both men and women, throughout the United States and the former territories of the Philippines and the Panama Canal.

As Thucydides stated, "History is Philosophy teaching by examples."

The amount of educational resources that we have as Elks is staggering. Every time I go online and visit ELKS.ORG, I am astounded at what I can find. Did you realize that (and I say this because of the alarming growth of this industry) there has been a decline in school performance? Students who smoke marijuana may get lower grades and may be more likely to drop out of high school than their peers who do not use. There is an increased risk of mental health issues. Marijuana use has been linked to a range of mental health problems in teens such as depression and anxiety. Impaired driving. Driving while impaired by any substance, including marijuana, is dangerous. Marijuana impedes a number of skills required for safe driving, such as reaction time, coordination, and concentration. And yes, there is a potential for addiction. Research shows that about 1 in 6 teens who repeatedly use marijuana can become addicted. These teens may make unsuccessful efforts to quit using marijuana or give up important activities with friends and family in favor of using marijuana.

Where did I get this information? I got it from our national website.

We are very blessed to have been born in this great nation. The Constitution and our laws give us many rights and privileges that others do not or can not get. There are opportunities abound, there is freedom to do what you want to do with out any fear of recrimination, America is a great place to be. Even with others believing in something vastly different than you.



Is there a minimum / maximum donation?

The minimum donation on givetolincoln.com is \$10.

There is no maximum donation limit. Household gifts exceeding \$10,000 per nonprofit will be eligible for match fund dollars up to \$10,000, and any amount in excess of \$10,000 will not be eligible for the match fund.

What does all of this mean for the Elks?

The Elks scholarship fund is eligible to receive funds through the Give to Lincoln Day event. This is the fourth year we have participated in this event, and have increased our base scholarship fund each year. If you have ever wanted to give to the scholarship fund, now is the time. All contributions are tax deductible and will be increased by the matching funds through the Lincoln Community Foundation.
