75,000 New Elks? 30-year High!

The BPOE has made its strongest progress in membership since 1980. We were down just 4,155 members or 0.5 percent. We added 75,709 new members and reinstatements.

This marks four consecutive years of improvement! We again set a new national record for the fewest membership cancellations.

We began this fraternal year with 7,072 fewer delinquents than the previous year and 26028 fewer delinquents than three years ago.

Initiatives such as the All American Lodge Contest are great for driving membership and promoting Elkdom. Osage Community, MO lodge #2705, the 2nd place winner in Division IV, held fundraisers to provide groceries and toiletries for 100 families and toys for 378 children at Christmas. The lodge also used a Gratitude Grant to fund Project Prom/Graduation for three high schools and an Anniversary Grant to send two teens to flight camp. Osage Community welcomed 100 new members over the past year for a net gain of 33 new members.

We've made a three-year improvement of \$2.6 million while reducing delinquency in our lodges. Thank you for all you have done to help make that happen!

Record for Donations Could Be Even Higher

The 2017-2018 Membership Report was filed online via CLMS2. As of March 31, the Order ended the year with a total membership of 770,937, for a total loss of 4,155 (-0.5%). It is the smallest one-year decline in more than three decades. With more attention to our membership, the Order can show a gain in the next couple of years.

Totals from the Annual Charity Reports show the Order donated an all-time high of \$675,985,245 in time, mileage, and in-kind gifts. This dollar amount would have been even greater, but 30 lodges did not file a charity report. Again, this year, with everyone's help, we will strive to reach that elusive 100% reported.

The San Antonio Grand Lodge Convention and 150th Anniversary celebration has come and gone. Thanks to the Texas Host Committee, the volunteers, and Past Grand Exalted Rulers Charles F. Williams and John D. Amen for providing the manpower for another successful convention.

Now, it is onward to St. Louis, MO and the 2019 Convention!

October is a month of activity as deadlines loom.

Patriotism Week, held this year from September 10-16, is the perfect time to start to introduce the Americanism Essay Contest to your local schools. It is due to your Lodge by December 15 but NOW is the time to ask schools to get it into their curriculums. Make sure to pass this message on to your Americanism Chairperson.

Your A&A Committee should plan to meet with the secretary and treasurer to review all finances, ensure budgets are revised, and check that records are being maintained according to statute. The importance of this committee's work cannot be overstated, and every effort should be made to swiftly accommodate requests.

Red Ribbon Week runs from October 23-31. This is an opportunity for your Lodge to support the Elks Drug Awareness Program while procuring some positive exposure in your community. Ask local school officials and law enforcement personnel how your Lodge can help spread the word about the dangers of drugs most prevalent in your community.

Knight's Tales

Hallo an meine Fellow Elks!

Did you know that the Oktoberfest tradition started in 1810 to celebrate the October 12th marriage of Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig to the Saxon-Hildburghausen Princess Therese? The citizens of Munich were invited to join in the festivities which were held over five days on the fields in front of the city gates. The main event of the original Oktoberfest was a horse race.

Anniversary celebrations were held annually thereafter eventually becoming larger and more elaborate. In 1818, a carousel and two swings were set up for the revelers. Such amusements were few in the first decades of the festival, but party-goers were amply entertained by the tree climbing competitions, wheel barrow and sack races, mush eating contests, and goose chases. By 1870s, mechanical rides were an expanding feature of the festival and in 1908, the festival boasted Germany's first roller coaster. When the city began allowing beer on the fairgrounds, makeshift beer stands began cropping up, and their number increased steadily until they were eventually replaced by beer halls in 1896. The beer halls, like the beer tents of today, were sponsored by the local breweries.

The festival was eventually prolonged and moved ahead to September to allow for better weather conditions. Today, the last day of the festival is the first Sunday in October. In 2006, the Oktoberfest extended two extra days because the first Tuesday, October 3, was a national holiday. Over the past 200 years, Oktoberfest was canceled 24 times due to cholera epidemics and war.

Today Oktoberfest, or the world's largest beer festival, is held annually in Munich, Germany. The 16-day party attracts over 6 million people every year who consume 1.5 million gallons of beer, 200,000 pairs of pork sausage, and 480,000 spit-roasted chickens during the two-week. While the event reinforces stereotypical images of beer-loving, meat-loving Germans dressed in dirndls and lederhosen, visitors to the annual event come from all over the world. Oktoberfest is in fact one of Munich's largest and most profitable tourist attractions. It brings over 450 million euros to the city's coffers each year.

For the past several weeks I have been in Tijuana Mexico. It was very interesting to hear from the people of Mexico's 4th largest city on how the Americans have embraced the use of Marijuana.

As I was writing this article, a BBC news article "popped" up. It stated that cocaine production hit a record level in the past year. If you didn't know it, Columbia is the largest producer of Cocaine. Can you guess who is the largest consumer of it? (Hint: we are)

Did you know that we have a Red Ribbon Week? This is the nation's oldest and largest drug prevention program, reaching millions of Americans during the last week of October every year. We all need to wear a Red Ribbon. By wearing red ribbons and participating in community anti-drug events, young people pledge to live a drug-free lifestyle and pay tribute to DEA Special Agent Enriqué "Kiki" Camarena, who's murder prompted a national outcry against the drug cartels that is still heard today.

Americans fill over 4 billion prescriptions each year, but up to 40% of those drugs go unused. It's a definite challenge to safely dispose of 200 million pounds of unused medication each year. Many communities participate in semi-annual drug take-back days where their citizens can take their personal unused medications to a location for drop-off and proper disposal. However, people often need to dispose of medications more frequently. Storing unused medications for many months can increase the risk of those drugs getting into the wrong hands.
