Veteran's Day Remembered

Veteran's Day Remembered

An original speech, written and presented by Americanism Committee Chairman William "Doc" Ryan, during a Veteran's Day Service at the Boca Raton Cemetery November 11, 2002

"On the Mall in our Nation's Capital, between the Washington Monument and the Jefferson Memorial, stands the Vietnam Memorial Wall and the tribute to my generation's war, the Korean Memorial. There were many conflicts during the last century that involved American citizens. Of all the armed involvements there is one that stands alone in terms of total commitment by all the American people -- World War Two.

In the late 1930s, as the forces of evil and darkness began their siege of European nations, America tended to stand aside, looking on and offering moral support. After all, we fought World War One and remembered it as "the War to end all Wars." The German onslaught was a hard lesson in just how quickly circumstances can change.

On December 7, 1941 a "Day of Infamy" was proclaimed by President Franklin Roosevelt. The Japanese left us with no choice but to become totally immersed in a war of survival. This was not someone else's war, but an attack of a magnitude that threatened, for the first time, the very identity and sovereignty of our young nation. The declaration of war by the Japanese, in tandem with the Germans and the Italians, brought this response from the Prime Minister of Great Britain, Sir Winston Churchill. Churchill stated, "Many people have been astonished, that on the same day, the Japanese have seen fit to declare war on the United States of America and the British Empire. They have indeed embarked on a very considerable undertaking. What kind of people do they think we are? Is it possible they don't realize that we will persevere against them until they are taught a lesson that they and the world will never forget?"

These were brave words, but was his confidence warranted? Our American fleet was destroyed at Pearl Harbor. Our army was undertrained and undermanned. As a nation we were woefully unprepared. The Germans and the Japanese had been building their war machines for years. German General Hermann Goering reassured his skeptics, "Americans can't build airplanes and tanks, but they are very good at making refrigerators and razor blades." He was wrong! The same processes that were used to mass-produce consumer goods were transferred over to make war goods.

From 1937 to 1941 Japan prided itself on tripling the size of its air force from 1,500 to 4,500 planes. By 1943, American factories were producing 7,000 planes a month. Henry Kaiser designed the 10,000-ton Liberty Ship that could be produced in four and one-half days and we launched over 8,000 during the war. Our service people fought and died in the various military theatres in Europe and the Pacific. However, it was the mobilization of our domestic resources that eventually made it possible for our military to overcome and conquer our enemies.

At the Big Three Conference in Tehran, Soviet Dictator Joseph Stalin offered a toast, "To American productivity, without which this war would have been lost." Women came out of the homes and into the factories. My mother, Lillian, who had never worked outside the home, went to Miami Airport and became a riveter. Lillian, not Rosie the Riveter, became an integral part of a commitment by all Americans to preserve our national heritage.

Now, 57 years later, we honor all those Americans, dead and living, who paid an enormous price so future generations could live in freedom and prosperity. The wisdom of that sacrifice is being fulfilled worldwide. More and more communist and socialist economies are embracing democratic principles. American's bravery, sacrifice, courage and selfless patriotism defended not only our American way of life, but has brought democracy, freedom and liberty to millions of people in nations near and far. To this end we salute all our World War Two Veterans and all Americans who made our victory possible. God Bless You One and All -- and God Bless America."

November and December of our year can be referred to as the "Giving point". There are so many things, people and events that we can truly give a portion of our earnings and time to that it can be so overwhelming.

A time for all of us to salute and honor our service men and women is November 11th, Veterans Day. This National Holiday originated as "Armistice Day", President Woodrow Wilson gave fellow ELK General John Pershing, American Expeditionary Force Commander of WWI. General Pershing was also a Professor of Military Science and Tactics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln from 1891 to 1895, where he created the Pershing Rifles. The honor of setting the exact moment that the Armistice would forever be marked was left up to him. Pershing selected the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month his personal tribute to the memory of those soldiers, "Elks and non-Elks alike," who had fallen.

Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans—living or dead—but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.

In 1941, the US House and Senate passed a resolution saying that Thanksgiving would occur on the fourth Thursday of November. This would thereby maintain the Christmas shopping season during years when November had five Thursdays.

This may answer why the holiday is scheduled the way that it is, but it doesn't explain why Thursday was chosen instead of another day of the week. But some have said it was to create Black Friday, so they say.

Now we have three days which are encouraging us but this November please remember that 11.6% of your fellow Nebraska's are considered food insecure. This is according to the Map the Meal Gap report from Feeding America. Over 200,000 Nebraskans struggle with food insecurity.

What is food insecurity? Food insecurity is defined as being without reliable access to affordable and nutritious food.

But what can we do as Elks?

There are so many ways we can make a difference. From donating food and funds to contributing your time through volunteering, you can choose what's most meaningful for you.

Places like; We Can Do This, The Food Bank, People's City Mission, Tabitha, Matt Talbot are some examples of local agencies from which you can choose to donate. You can also donate to our very own ENF.

When you see a Vet or a First Responder give them a hearty thank you. If you are so moved to donate just keep it in mind that you are making it a November for others and yourself to Remember. Have a Fantastic November. We will be seeing you around our Lodge!




