Alcohol provision policies keep spirits high.

November is when we move into the season of holidays. It is a time of festivity and gatherings when people join together for good times and camaraderie. It is also a time we need to be extra vigilant for those who may be consuming alcohol.

In recent years, the Elks have made a strengthened commitment that our Lodges will not allow the overserving of alcohol under any circumstances. The needless heartbreak and loss that can arise when people get on the road while under the influence of alcohol is something we just don't want to see. In my state, California, there are special programs in place that every person involved in the sale or provision of alcohol, whether paid or volunteer, must go through. Many, if not all, of the other states and associations have similar requirements. I ask every Lodge to make the effort to ensure all covered people are properly trained so that the coming season of festivity can be just that for everyone.

Something that isn't touched on enough, in my mind, is the concept of family. That network of those closest to us that we can rely on and share good times. Family is precious. But for many of us there really isn't anyone to share the good times with, and it is in this season that loneliness is all the more biting for those without others close to them. It is for those people, more than for all the rest, that our Lodges can play an extremely important role in filling that empty space.

I am sure that the name of Henry Nicholas John Gunther is not very familiar to you. You see Henry was an American soldier and was likely the last soldier to be killed during World War I. He was killed at 10:59 a.m., about one minute before the Armistice was to take effect at 11:00 a.m. Henry was born into a German-American family in Baltimore, Maryland, on June 6, 1895. His parents were both children of German immigrants. He grew up in a neighborhood heavily influenced by Germans. Gunther worked as a bookkeeper and clerk at the National Bank of Baltimore as a young man. He was drafted into the US Army to fight for the US Forces against Germany. His rank was that of a Supply Sergeant. He was assigned to the 57th Brigade of the 79th Infantry Division. Why do I mention Henry? Please read on.

This 11th month, November, is a month that we should hold on high. It is the month that every one of us, as Americans, should properly thank individuals that put their lives on the line for us, whether in combat or civilian life. It's imperative that all Elks know the history of Veterans Day so that we can honor these individuals. Veterans Day, formerly known as Armistice Day, was originally set as a U.S. legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, which officially took place on November 11, 1918.

It was explained to me that when hostilities ceased in November of 1918, President Wilson gave the American Expeditionary Force Commander, General John "Black Jack" Pershing, full authority to set the date and time of the Armistice. As we should realize General Pershing was an active and enthusiastic Elk, and selected the 11th hour of the 11th day of November, the 11th month, as the effective time of the Armistice. This was Pershing's salute to the memory of those soldiers "Elks and non-Elks alike" who perished during the long and brutal conflict.

The General's "Order of The Day" on the following day specifically mentioned Gunther as the last American killed in the war. The Army posthumously awarded him a Divisional Citation for Gallantry in Action and the Distinguished Service Cross. Several years later a post, number 1858 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in east Baltimore, was named after him.

The hour of 11 p.m. continues to have a special significance to us, as it is the time when, at any evening Elks event, all activity ceases and all need to rise while the chimes ring 11 times and the "Eleven O'clock Toast" is given in recollection of deceased members. Remember we are all tied to this day!

November is a time for transition. This month in particular is our buffer between fall and winter. Most of the leaves have fallen off the trees, it is not too awful cold and hopefully there is absolutely no snow or ice. Daylight Saving Time ends on Sunday, November 5 at 2 a.m. so remember to turn your clocks back an hour. Thanksgiving on the 23rd gives us time to reflect and give thanks for all that has been bountifully given to us.

Coach John Wooden once stated "Be true to yourself, help others, make each day your masterpiece, make friendship a fine art, drink deeply from good books - especially the Bible, build a shelter against a rainy day, give thanks for your blessings and pray for guidance every day." It's a favorite quote of mine. It rings so true!

It was a blustery day, with leaves and small branches launching a frontal assault against everyone and anyone who dared to brave this unannounced offensive. But people are people, with those who had to come and go withstanding nature's onslaught as best they could. Yet the mission for a few drove those involved to the limit of their endurance in seeking some kind of retribution.

Much later, to the relief of most of the mounted escort, and after a much needed respite from their mounted journey, they settled in for the trial to come. They weren't disappointed.

After much comment among the prosecutor, the defense, and the judges listening to this case, it came out that the defendant may have erred in deed when it came to the law as becoming a knight, but there was much disagreement as to what just proceedings against the defendant should levied. Space Center, Houston (AP) Discovery's first flight re-established the shuttle as a reliable system for launching satellites and erased most of the uncertainties raised by the failure of two satellites to reach proper orbits last February, and by the thrice-delayed launch of the ship itself. The shuttle landed without a hitch early Wednesday on the desert lakebed at Edwards Air Force Base, CA. Commander Hank Hartsfield and pilot Michael Coats guided the 102-ton Discovery through clear skies to a touchdown, 10 minutes after sunrise. Did You Realize?!

The primary object of our Order is the practice of Charity in its broadest significance, not merely that of alms giving.

Its service in this wide field necessarily involves a great diversity of activities, which naturally are influenced by local conditions. It therefore adopted early the policy of permitting its Subordinate Lodges to select for themselves the benevolent endeavors in which they severally desired to engage, rather than to require them to participate solely in national projects undertaken by the Order as whole.

However, throughout its history, the Order has endeavored to maintain itself in readiness, as a national body, to extend its aid in cases of major catastrophe and misfortune. Through its official agencies in all parts of the country, it has been able to render such assistance with a promptness, effectiveness and lack of red tape, which have tremendously enhanced the practical helpfulness of its adopted measures.

For many years the aggregate expenditures of the Subordinate Lodges for charitable purposes have run into millions of dollars each year, covering humanitarian services of infinite variety. Among the most usual of such activities may be mentioned the following: food to the hungry; shelter for the homeless; clothing and fuel for the needy; milk for the undernourished babies; medical attention to the sick; baskets to the poor at Christmas and Thanksgiving; outings for underprivileged children; entertainment for shut-ins; education for young people; artificial limbs for the maimed; hospital beds; free clinics; night schools. And the list might be indefinitely extended.

All of the State Elks Associations have undertaken important and extensive charitable works within their own several jurisdictions, determined by the particular conditions therein existing and the preferences of their constituent members. They include rehabilitation of crippled children, treatment of indigent tubercular patients, provision for scholarships to worthy students, maintenance of orphans, boys' camps, training of the blind, eyeglasses for needy boys and girls, cerebral palsy clinics, cancer clinics, and other state wide projects of similar character and of equal worthiness, which are being carried on as continuing activities. No history of social service in the United States would be complete without an inspiring chapter devoted to the achievements of the Order of Elks in this field.

In the field of patriotic service, the Order of Elks has likewise proved itself an agency of singular force and effectiveness. Organized at a time when the bitterness and rancor of the Civil War had left their wounds on every heart on both sides of the Mason-Dixon line, the Order patiently taught its members through the years, drawn as they were from all sections of the country, that bitterness ought to be sweetened; that rancor ought to be assuaged; those wounds ought to be healed.

Through the widening influence of its members, thus bound together by the ties of brotherhood, and thus fraternally schooled, the restoration of national accord was assuredly hastened, and a patriotic service of superlative importance was thus performed. Never an altar is erected in all its jurisdiction, but that the first emblem to benevolently be placed beside it is the American Flag. No man is permitted to stand in front of that flag and altar and assume the obligation of membership unless he be an American citizen. And at the beginning of every Lodge session he attends he is required to renew his pledge of allegiance to that flag and all for which it stands.

Every Subordinate Lodge of the Order is a patriotic watch tower, in which keen minds are alert to discover insidious attacks upon our countries cherished institutions, and in which loyal and courageous hearts are promptly mobilized for every appropriate defensive activity. The combined influences of these continuing patriotic activities of the Order, operating upon the minds and hearts of other countless thousands, are beyond calculation.
